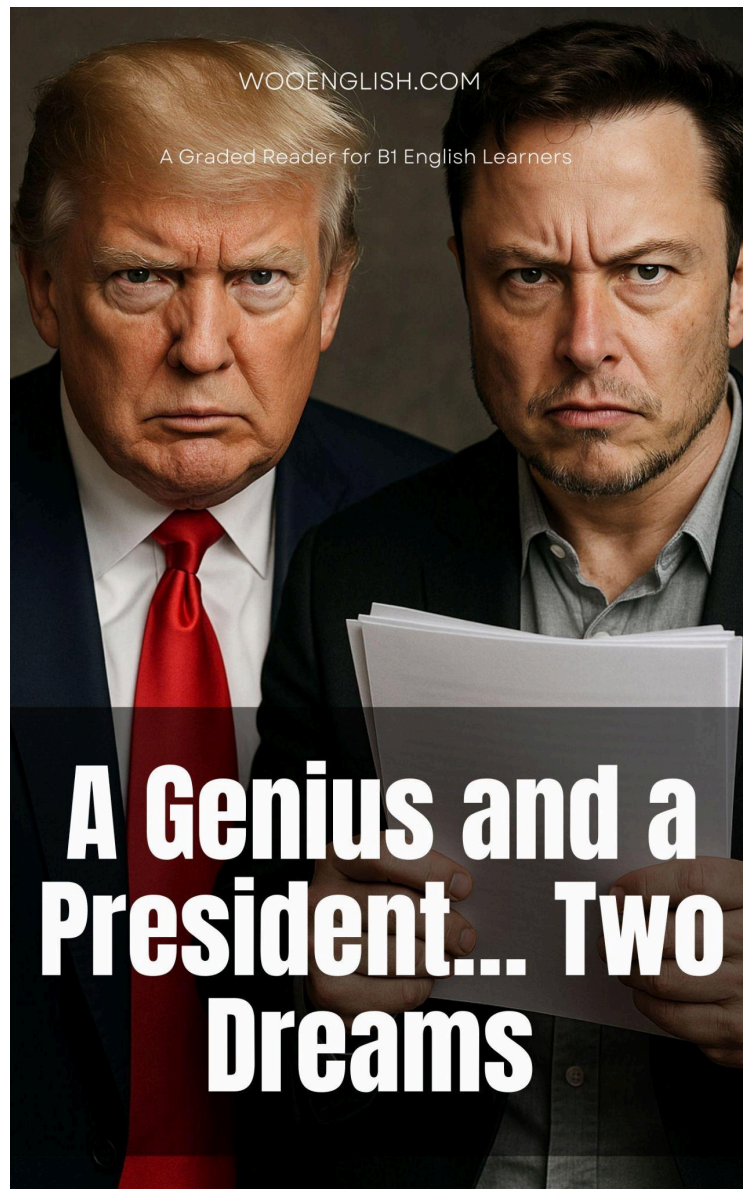


A Genius and a President
