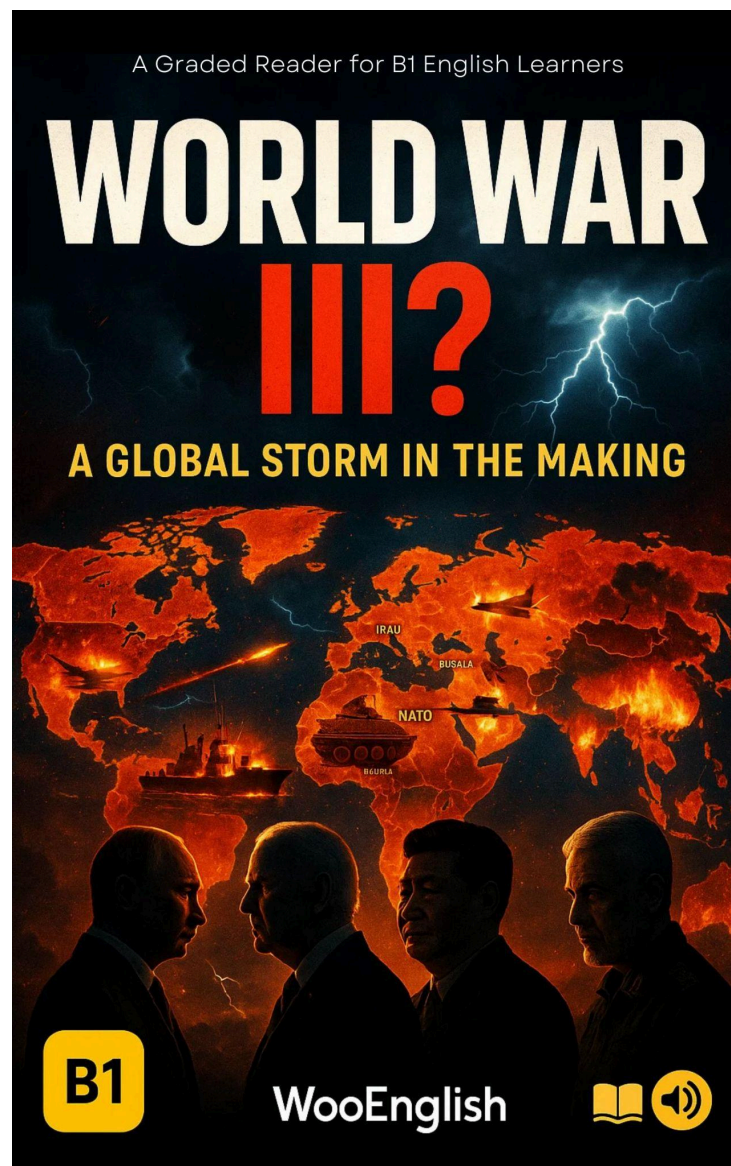


World War III A global storm in the making
